Writing a good play is hard; writing a good play to tell a story in 20 minutes is extremely hard! So I think we have been very fortunate to be able to present to you these eight fine one-acts by local playwrights -- all original and unpublished. And our directors have done a wonderful job bringing them to the stage.

In the case of this festival, it helps that at least part of the work has already been done for the playwrights: establishing a theme and characters. That's because all these plays are derived from existing plays by asking the questions "What if ... " or "What then?"

What if ... we took that play and changed its ending — because characters or relationships developed differently?

OR

What then? After that play ends, what happens to the characters and their relationships? You might call these mini-sequels.

As you will see, the results can be very different from what the original playwrights had in mind! I know you will find them entertaining, sometimes wacky, and often thought-provoking.

Passion's Slave by Jackie Pittman

Directed by Bob Rosenberg
Based on "The Tragedy of Hamlet, Prince of Denmark" by William
Shakespeare (1600?)

Hamlet suspects his uncle Claudius (the current king) and his mother Gertrude (now married to Claudius) of the murder of Hamlet's father (the former king). Hamlet appears crazy, but may be feigning madness in order to expose Claudius's crime. Hamlet eventually causes the deaths of Polonius and Ophelia, which Laertes wishes to avenge, with the help of Claudius. In this twist, Horatio seeks advice on how to keep Hamlet from further harm.

In modern times, a well-worn Count Dracula visits an employment office, hoping to find a normal, everyday way of life.

R.U.R. (Rossum's Universal Robots) introduced the word "robot" to modern language. It takes place during a time when humans have begun mass-producing and integrating robots into their everyday lives. Over the tenyear period that the play spans, the robots become more advanced and end up rebelling, wiping out the entire human race, except one man. The humans, before their extinction, have managed to destroy the only copy of the formula to produce robots, and the play ends (and this one begins) with two races on the brink of destruction.

While Much Ado About Nothing ended on a happy note (Benedick marrying Beatrice, and Claudio marrying Hero), the villainous Don John has broken out of prison and is hungry for revenge. His plot: To kill Claudio and frame his brother Don Pedro for it so that he can steal his crown. Meanwhile, Messina is buzzing with romantic tension between at least two budding couples.

Where Oh Where is Godot? (And Other Questions) by Mike Brennan

Directed by Robyn Stafford
Based on "Waiting for Godot" by Samuel Beckett (1953)

Waiting for Godot takes place over the course of two days, during which two older gentlemen, Didi and Gogo, wait for a man named Godot, who they hear has a job opening. They pass the time by joking and playing with each other, while pondering serious questions about life and happiness. Fed up with waiting, they attempt to commit suicide, only to have that fail as well. The play ends with them resigned to their fates to be forever waiting for the mysterious Godot.

Othello is a Venetian general who promotes Cassio to the position of lieutenant, much to the chagrin of lago, an ensign in his army, who wanted the position for himself. Feeling betrayed, lago exacts revenge by tricking Othello into believing that his young bride is having an affair with Cassio. "Uh, Hello" picks up at the moment after Othello has killed Desdemona, when lago reveals that things are not as they seem.

The first of Chekhov's major plays, The Seagull is set on a country estate in late 19th century Russia. It is a somewhat dark comedy about the romantic entanglements and creative conflicts of a group of Russian aristocrats and the servants on their country estate. This version imagines that Masha, a minor character in the original, having no patience for the subtext, takes matters into her own hands and brings some common sense and humor back into Chekhov's "comedy."
