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## **DIRECTOR'S NOTE**

This year marks the 80th anniversary of *The Philadelphia Story's* Broadway debut. A hit on stage, it revitalized Katherine Hepburn's career and almost immediately spawned the classic movie most of us are familiar with. The question is, what does *The Philadelphia Story* have to tell us after all this time? It's still a funny show. The quips and situational humor in this comedy of manners still tickle us – but more than that I think that the show does have some wisdom to share about the way we treat each other.

Tracy Lord begins the play as a remarkable woman for her time, intelligent and accomplished. She strives to be superior in all things, but unfortunately she expects the same of those around her. It's fair to say that she can get a bit rough with those people around her when she detects a weakness. It's only by letting herself make mistakes that she begins to understand and forgive the people around her. Maybe it's our imperfections that can make us great people? And maybe accepting mistakes in other people is what let's us really love them – and ourselves?

The idea that perfection may not be a viable goal seems a bit prescient, particularly for women who saw their expectations for themselves increase tenfold during women's liberation. There's a whole genre of writing addressing the impossible expectations of modern women: successful at work and successful at home. Maybe Tracy Lord has the answer. Even outstanding women don't have to be perfect – and they can love their partners even if they aren't perfect either.

Not all of the perspectives presented in *The Philadelphia Story* have aged as well. Some of the sexual politics of the time left us scratching our heads and the pressure between the upper and lower classes presented here has settled into an uneasy detente over the years. Even so, I think the play still has a lot to say about people – and this early look at the relationship between celebrities and the media seems very relevant. If only the Lords had an Instagram page ...

We hope you enjoy our production of *The Philadelphia Story*, whether it's for the budding romance(s), the laughs and one-liners, a bit of nostalgia, or an examination in the way we all learn to accept ourselves over time.

I'd like to thank this talented group of performers and staffers who helped assemble this production, but I'd also like to thank an audience who has an appetite for something a little more introspective and urbane than a lot of theatrical offerings out there.

Settle in and enjoy our trip to Philadelphia. We hope you enjoy it.
